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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In most areas we audited, District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in most areas we examined.

However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to the District management in a letter dated May 24, 2017 related to the operations at the Aquatic Center. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Snohomish School District No. 201 from September 1, 2015 through August 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Self-insurance
- Financial condition
- Aquatics Center departmental review
- Procurement
- Safeguarding of assets
- Controls over key software applications
- Gifting of public resources

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Snohomish School District No. 201 provides public school services to approximately 10,000 students in kindergarten through 12th grade. The District's service area covers 128 square miles including the city of Snohomish and neighboring unincorporated portions of Snohomish County. The District operates two high schools, an alternative high school, two middle schools, 10 elementary schools, a preschool and a parent partnership program for home-school families, and an aquatic center.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors governs the District. The Board appoints a Superintendent to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its 614 certified and 500 classified employees. For the 2015-2016 school year, the District had expenditures of \$140,800,390.
